



either call the office, contact staff, or PM the Facebook page. Likewise if





ROAD CROSSING Our crossing is monitored from 8.20am to 8.40am each day and 2:55pm till 3.10pm. It is important students cross during this time and/or have been taught about crossing the road. It is a state highway and numerous drivers do not stop for our students, even if they are waiting at the crossing, so they need to know not to walk out until someone stops. The yellow lines outside the school are there to help patrollers see what is coming. It is an offence to park there and you can be fined for this. Please encourage your child to use the crossing, as 🏲 cars parked on the roadside make visibility limited. The driveway will be closed during crossing times. It is a school expectation that students use the pedestrian crossing when crossing South Road.


