At the suspension meeting I talk about the school's concerns and then the student, their whanau and/or their support person (if they have one) speaks. The Board may ask further questions and they will then meet by themselves to make a decision about the student's future at our school. The Board may allow the student to return to school with or without conditions around their behaviour and/or attitude or they may decide to permanently exclude them from our school. No staff



The language of growth mindset is integrated throughout our lessons and constantly revisited. Reading is important. We are encouraging our students to read all the time.
